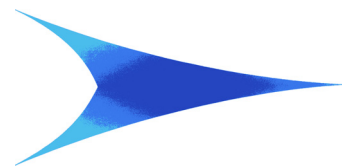

Australians in Italy – You Count as Well

On Tuesday 8 August, the Australian Bureau of Statistics will count everyone in Australia.

But the 2006 Australian Census won't take into account Australia's sizable diaspora of approximately one million people.

More than 30,000 Australians are estimated to be living permanently in Italy, and thousands more visit as tourists or work and study in Italy for short periods.

While Italy has been reaching out to Italians in Australia and other countries and gave them an opportunity to vote in the recent Italian general election, by contrast Australia is only now coming to understand that it is not just a nation of immigration, but also a nation of emigration.

Australians in Italy are a diverse group of all ages. Some migrated to Australia post-World War II and then returned to live in Italy later in life. Others who were born in Australia to Italian migrants and grew up Down Under have now come to Italy to live and work in the country of their parents' birth. And other Australians, without an Italian family connection, have adopted Italy as their temporary or permanent home for educational, professional or personal reasons, or perhaps because they've fallen in love with Italian culture and the Italian lifestyle.

Since January 2004 Australia and Italy have been party to a special "working holiday visa" arrangement which allows young Australians up to the age of 30 to spend up to twelve months in Italy on a special visa, and vice versa.

Finding all of Australia's unofficial ambassadors currently spread throughout Italy would be an impossible task. But those that can be reached online, via the media, through various Australian expatriate organisations, and through their families and friends are being strongly encouraged to participate in a new independent non-governmental online survey of the Australian diaspora.

Launched today to coincide with the day of the official Australian Census, and an initiative of the New York-based organisation **Advance** working in partnership with the **Southern Cross Group**, **One Million More – the Census of Australians Abroad** is aiming to achieve participation levels greater than any previous surveys of overseas Australians. A global hunt is on to track down as many as possible of the "missing million".

Taking approximately 20 minutes to complete on an entirely anonymous basis, the **One Million More** survey asks Australia's far-flung citizens, former citizens and others overseas with a very close family connection to the country to respond to some key questions adapted from the official Australian Census. It also includes specific questions designed to get to the heart of the experiences and issues faced by those living outside Australia.

Rome-based Southern Cross Group volunteer Robert Tuppini said "Italy offers Australians some wonderful opportunities and it's no wonder that so many Australians are to be found here. We hope that **One Million More** will enable us to collect up-to-date, extensive and specific data about them. The data will be an indispensable tool going forward for all those concerned with developing and fostering Australia's relationship with its extensive diaspora." Mr Tuppini is the Australian-born son of Italian migrants to Australia.

The data collected will be used in further academic research to be undertaken at Adelaide University by Professor Graeme Hugo, already widely known for his pioneering studies of the Australian diaspora. In addition, the Southern Cross Group will draw on the survey findings to guide its ongoing advocacy and support efforts and inform its continuing dialogue with the Australian government on diaspora issues. All survey results and conclusions will be published on the internet as they become available.

"We ask everyone who knows an Australian in Italy to let them know about **One Million More** and urge them to take part. Every single one of them is an integral part of Australia." Mr Tuppini said.

One Million More – the Census of Australians Abroad opens on Tuesday 8 August 2006 and will remain online until Saturday 30 September 2006.
